Dear OGS members,

As some of you may know, earlier this year Preston Peterson, MD, MBA stepped down from his role as OGS President to focus on his role at Kaiser as Section Chief of Geriatrics. We appreciate all work he has done to keep our organization moving along during the last few challenging years.

I have returned as President and look forward to working with all of you for the next few years.

The board has been busy making plans for OGS and I wanted to share some of these with you.

OGS Annual Conference - as of now we are planning a return to an in-person conference in October 2022 in Sunriver. Emily Morgan continues to lead the education committee as they prepare what is shaping up to be another excellent weekend of CME and networking among our members. It will be great to be back together in Sunriver!

Value for membership - For the past 22 years we have put most of our energy into providing a high-quality annual meeting to help educate geriatric providers in the PNW. This has been a tremendous success and we plan to continue this as our flagship event each year. However, moving forward we will be looking to develop additional ways to help educate our members and allow them to interact throughout the year. Our goal is to create educational opportunities such as access to lectures, podcasts and forums where our members can interact on a regular basis and on more flexible schedule. More on this topic to come.

OGS recognized with its second AGS State Affiliate Award - earlier this year OGS was recognized by AGS for our collaborative effort with ACP and ORPALTC in producing the educational series "*Tackling Prescription Overload*". This was a 4-part series addressing deprescribing in the inpatient, outpatient, post-acute and long-term care settings, including hospice. Harry Krulewitch, OGS member and past president, was the initial spark for this project that, with the organizational skills of Mary Olhausen, became a group effort with the above partners and several excellent clinicians, pharmacists and educators that reached almost 200 attendees via 4 live ZOOM presentations. Alzheimer's disease planning in Oregon - SPADO - State Plan for Alzheimer's and related Dementia's in Oregon is multifaceted group working to plan for the impact of dementia in Oregon. SPADO was formed in 2010 and includes non-profit organizations, state government agencies, academic researchers, issue experts, physicians, family caregivers, care providers, and state legislators. The 2A subgroup will be preparing a survey to better understand the needs of clinicians in Oregon. It will be coming to providers via several different platforms and organizations. AGS – CLINICIAN OF THE YEAR - HELEN KAO, MD

The AGS Clinician of the Year Award recognizes exceptional health professionals who deliver outstanding care to older adults and who model the importance of geriatrics for our country. This year's honoree is **Helen S. Kao, MD**, who is Medical Director of Clinical Innovations at Lumina Hospice & Palliative Care, and Adjunct Professor at UCSF School of Medicine.

Dr. Kao, a board-certified physician in internal medicine with certificates of added qualifications in geriatrics and hospice and palliative care, has created programs to serve older adults with advanced and terminal illnesses. She directed UCSF's house calls program and was responsible for

tripling its capacity to serve older adults. In her current role at Lumina Hospice and Palliative Care in Corvallis, Oregon, Dr. Kao continues to develop and provide palliative and geriatrics services by overseeing a growing palliative case management program.

Promoting diversity in geriatrics is an essential aspect of Dr. Kao's career. As Chair of the Residential Ombudsman and Public Guardian Advisory Board (ROPGAP), she advocates for Oregonians with disabilities and helps elevate the caregiver workforce which is predominantly made up of women and

BIPOC individuals. In this role, Dr. Kao helps shape the advocacy priorities of the board, which focus on protecting the rights of people with dementia, mental health conditions and intellectual or developmental disabilities.

Invited to present to scores of regional and national meetings and symposia, Dr. Kao has authored or co-authored textbooks on topics in geriatrics, and her articles have been published in leading peer-reviewed medical journals.

An AGS member since 2007, Dr. Kao received her BA cum laude from Harvard and her MD from the University of California, San Francisco School of Medicine, where she served residency in the Program in Residency Investigation Methods and Epidemiology (PRIME) Internal Medicine and fellowship in Geriatrics. She has been honored for professional excellence by some 20 prestigious awards—including UCSF’s Council of Master Clinicians and most recently the Elizabeth Wessinger Award, recognizing people who make a difference for end-of-life care in Oregon and across the nation.

Oregon Geriatrics Society (OGS), at their Public Policy Committee meeting in October of 2019, agreed to develop a Deprescribing Task Force for purpose of recommending to OGS Board of Directors, to develop an educational program on Deprescribing. The OGS Board of Directors accepted the proposal which recommended partnering with Oregon Post-Acute & Long-Term Care (ORPALTC) and Oregon Chapter American College of Physicians (ORACP). ORPALTC and ORACP were contacted and enthusiastically joined forces with OGS to plan and convene a Deprescribing event. Thus, the **TACKLING PERSCRIPTION OVERLOAD: A 4-Part Series To Help You Design A Plan For Deprescribing** was a reality!!



The process to arrive at the *Tackling Prescription Overload*, started with OGS Public Policy Committee, Chaired by Harry Krulewitch, MD, MPH, in recommending to OGS Board of Directors to convene a program on Deprescribing. With OGS approval, and buy-in from ORACP and ORPALTC, a Planning Committee was formed. They met monthly for six months. Additionally, members of the Planning Committee served as a “liaison” for each of the four Session groups. The liaisons would report back to the Planning Committee, which helped with overall planning and strategizing for the Sessions to not duplicate/overlap. Oregon ACP took the lead for the CME process, budget, Zoom Invite, communicating with attendees, and evaluation data.

50 YEARS OF OREGON SENIOR DISABILITY POLICY AND ADVOCACY: AN HISTORICAL CHRONOLOGY 1969 - 2019

To the Senior and Disability Communities:

It is my pleasure to share the attached second edition of the *50 Years of Oregon Senior and Disability Policy and Advocacy: An Historical Chronology 1969-2019*, a labor of love project that chronicles year-by-year the major highlights and activities in Oregon's senior and disability policy development and advocacy since 1969, from an advocacy perspective. In particular, it highlights the development and maintenance of our nationally-renown community-based long-term services and supports system, as well as the very strong grassroots, coalition-based advocacy efforts in the senior and disability communities in Oregon.

I have spent nearly 20 years working on this chronology to look at the senior/disability legislative and policy decisions and achievements, controversies, important gatherings, relevant actions of advocates, legislators and administrators, and other pertinent activities over the past 50 years. This 2nd edition celebrates the 50th Anniversary of the Oregon State Council for Retired (Senior) Citizens (1969) and 40th Anniversary of United Seniors of Oregon (1979).

I have had the honor of working within the senior advocacy community in Oregon since the mid-1970s and have been involved in the organizing of nearly all the senior-oriented coalitions during that period. Over the next 45 years, I watched as the vision for the Oregon Project Independence and our future community-based long term care system materialized.

I have had the opportunity to advocate and work for the development and maintenance of what became the greatest community-based long term care system in the world for four decades.

I have had a particularly strong affiliation since the 1970s with the Oregon State Council of Retired Citizens, United Seniors of Oregon, Gray Panthers, and the Governor's Commission on Senior Services, all major players in the development of the senior service system in the late seventies and early eighties.

In the process, I have gotten to know the significant personalities that shaped Oregon's senior advocacy and policy work, as well as the administration of senior and disability services and programs, as we joined together as a community to develop the most comprehensive in-home and community-based long term care senior and disability service system in the nation, along with one of the most influential senior and disability advocacy networks.

The Chronology starts in 1969 when senior advocacy started to become established in Oregon with the formation of the Oregon State Council for Senior Citizens, the preparation for the 1971 White House Conference on Aging, and the strong support from a very sympathetic Governor Tom McCall. Within 10 years, an innovative group of advocates and administrators would form the foundation of our current in-home and community-based long term care system through the passage of SB 955 and the securing of a federal Medicaid Waiver, with strong support from Governor Vic Atiyeh's administration. The 1980s and 1990s saw the continued development of our innovative system of services and the inclusion of people with disabilities. The 1990s and early 2000s forced senior and disability advocates to defend and maintain their now comprehensive base of services and supports. As the once new millennium stretched more than two decades, we saw a more mature and established senior and disability services system and advocacy network. Each legislative year opens with a recap on advocacy and lobby activities in that session.

Through my decades of involvement in the United Seniors of Oregon, Oregon State Council for Retired Citizens, Governor's Commission Senior Services, Oregon Disabilities Commission, and the Gray Panthers, I have developed a large hard file system that chronicled senior and disability advocacy and policy development year by year since the late sixties, including memos, letters, hand-written notes, policy and legislative reports, legislation, meeting announcements, meeting minutes, and newsletters, primarily the Senior Challenge (published 1972 to 2005) and the United Seniors Reporter (published from 1982 to 1999). These were the principal resources used to develop the Chronology, relying on the perspectives of the actual people involved and the correspondence, documents and summaries developed at the time. One of my greatest motivations for writing this Chronology is that we not forget the historical implications of the development and growth of our national model senior and disability services system and the critical players who helped build and maintain it.

I always consider this a work in progress. If anyone reading this document finds a significant program/policy accomplishment or event that is missing, let me know and I will be glad to edit. Enjoy reading about 50 great years of senior/disability advocacy and policy development.
